## The sad death of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II and the Accession of His Majesty King Charles III on September 8th 2022.

Following the sad news of the death of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II at 6.30pm on Thursday 8th September, Noel Woodward rang the sanctum bell for 5 minutes, then David Bloor took over and chimed the tenor bell for a further 15 minutes. According to protocol and at the request of the Mayor of Rushcliffe, Cllr Tina Combellack; at 12 noon on Friday 9th September, David Bloor rang the tenor bell 96 times, one for each year of the Queen's life with Seona Baillie counting.

On Sunday evening 18th September the Mayor of Rushcliffe and members of the community joined a national minute of silence at the Village Hall.

When the news was announced, the village of Hickling was in the final stages of preparing for the annual Scarecrow Festival: "Hickling Scarecrow Festival will

Member, Christine Ellis had just returned from London after going down to see the Queen's coffin and all the flowers outside Buckingham Palace. She related to the WI her feelings and experiences in doing this – everyone was very moved to hear about this pilgrimage.

Most of the members remembered The Queen's Coronation and talked about their

memories of this day in 1953 when most thought it had snowed – but this was in fact due to the poor TV reception which gave a blurred snowing appearance on the screen. King Charles III was going to Wales on 16th September and member Liz Vear was delighted to hear he was going into the Cathedral where she had been married. The evening ended with a 2 minute silence and the singing of the National Anthem 'God Save the King'

Whilst walking home we both said even though it was very brief, we now felt we had




participated, if only a little, in the occasion rather than being just onlookers'.


Village Hall on Monday nights 8 – 10pm, from 26 September.



## HICKLING RESIDENTS WHO MADE A DIFFERENCE

## DOROTHY MARY ELNOR - better known as Mrs Windey

Dorothy Mary Elnor was bom on 24 June 1903 in Radcliffe on Trent, the daughter of Isaac and Jeanie M Elnor. When the 1911 Census was taken, Dorothy Mary was visiting a relative in Gamston. She is found in the household of John Wilson Elnor, a farmer and described as a visitor, aged 7yrs, a schoolgirl and bom in Radcliffe on Trent.

Throughout her life she was known by her middle name, Mary. She thought a great deal of her parents and the family were very close. She described her father who was a farmer, born in Colwick, as having poor eyesight and in later years using an ear trumpet. Her mother was born in Radcliffe on Trent and in 1901, the family were living in Shelford, near to Radcliffe on Trent.

At some point the family moved to Stockwell Lane, behind the Chequers in Cropwell Bishop. The Cropwell Bishop WI was formed in 1929 and Mary, although very young was one of its founder members. She also ran a drama group and was a girl guide leader. She was very involved in organising fetes, parades and concerts. Her family helped raise the



money for Cropwell Bishop Memorial Hall. Mary became a school mistress and in 1939 she is found living at 'Hanworth' Thraves Lane Bingham with her widowed mother. During WW11, Mary gave up teaching and worked as an inspector on the Trent Buses. She also worked as a special constable during the war years.

At the age of 41yrs, Mary got married to Charles Frederick Windey. They were married on 14 November 1945 at Cropwell Bishop. Her friends from the Trent Bus Co came to the wedding in their uniforms. Mary like silver items and antiques and so the Cropwell WI gave her a silver salt cellar as a wedding gift.

In 1945, Mary and her new husband moved to live in Elm House, Hickling. Mary was to have no children and devoted her life to community activities in Hickling.

The WI was an important part of her community involvement. Prior to the war, Hickling and Kinoulton had a combined WI but due to pressures on the women of Hickling to work on the farms and other war work, their WI was abandoned. Mrs Windey, as she was known, formed the new Hickling WI in 1947. In November 1947, WI records show she trained as a VCO and attended her first County Organisation subcommittee meeting in February 1948. She was appointed a VCO in July 1949 which was a position she held until her retirement in 1968, 19 years later. During these years her enthusiasm and dedication saw her serving on many Committees, including international ones and speaking at the WI Annual General Meeting in London. She was the WI County Vice Chairwoman from 1958 to 1961. She took great delight in going around the county of Nottinghamshire and meeting other WI members. Many remember her at the Newark Show in the WI tent in clean white overalls and a hat.

Mrs Windey died on 8<sup>th</sup> January 1990 aged 86yrs. She had recently been moved into a nursing home in Old Dalby under protest after a fall. She was cremated on 17th January 1990. Many people living in Hickling today will have their own memories of Mrs Windey - please contact me if you would like to add your thoughts. (Carol Beadle)





## Why do dogs lick us?

Licking is a natural behaviour for dogs. The puppies of wild dogs lick their parent's mouths to encourage them to regurgitate food. Mothers lick their pups to clean them and puppies lick their mothers in return. Licking is also a sign of affection; it feels good to the dog who licks.

## So why do dogs lick us?

Your dog may be showing affection, or they may lick as an appeasement behaviour if they think you are cross with them. They could be attention seeking or simply washing off good flavours- anything from salt on your skin to your soap or body lotion.

## Is it a good idea?

Bear in mind that dogs eat some yucky stuff and also wash their nether ends to keep them tidy. Allowing a dog to lick you, particularly on your face can share all of this with you. Conversely if you use medicated cream, topical oil or just body lotion it could be harmful to your dog. So, all round probably best avoided.

## How can you stop your dog from licking you?

As soon as your dog starts to lick you, ask your dog to sit. I then say something like 'no licking' as we want to introduce a command that in future your dog understands. This then gives you a chance to redirect their behaviour to something else such as a favourite toy, a chew or a snuffle mat. You will need to make sure that your family all do the same as otherwise your dog will take advantage of the mixed messages.

## Is that dog friendly?

I find it so rewarding to teach my clients how to understand their dog's language. Dogs are communicating all the time; they just do it in a different way to us. Whilst we communicate primarily through speech, dogs communicate primarily through their body language. They are also extremely good at interpretating our body language too! I thought you might find it interesting to learn how to spot a dog's stress signals this month. When a dog finds itself in a situation where they feel a little uncomfortable, they will start to show signs of minor distress.

For example, you may see a dog suddenly sniff the ground intently or scratch ferociously. This can happen if a dog is a little unsure or feeling a little overwhelmed. If this is ignored further signals may be given – a dog may start to lick their lips, to yawn widely or turn their head away. These signals are often missed but are a clear message that the dog is uncomfortable.

If the dog is still ignored, they may well escalate their body language signals yet further. You may notice the whites of the eyes become very visible or hear heavy panting. The dog might tremble, ears may flatten or hackles may rise. The dog is really trying to make its feelings known at this point and ignore them at your peril. This can be useful to know to help your own dog as well as being wary of a dog you are not familiar with. I hope this has helped you to understand some of the silent conversations happening

with our canine friends.

## Reader's ramblings, September, 2022

Over the last few years, it appears that I have regularly picked up the autumn slot for writing the church article for the magazine. Looking back over what I have written before, I seem to have reached an impasse this year on thinking of something new to write! And yet this year is probably at a point in time which will be like no other. As I write this, the press, the media and probably most of our minds are taken up with the fact and consequences of the Queen's death just five days ago. That in itself is a momentous event, and one which we know will bring grief and mourning to millions of people but, by the time you read this, that news will probably be three weeks old. Of course its impact will be wide and will go on, but there will be other headlines. What will not change is the advance of the seasons as Nature inexorably continues its course. Only this morning, I picked up conkers and acorns in the churchyard and shared them with some children in the church. If we look to the ancient origins of the word Harvest, we find that it has its roots in Latin and Greek, and it means 'to pluck fruit'. No doubt some of you have been engaged in harvesting already, and the black-berries in our lanes and fields suggest that they have been plentiful.

However, 'plentiful' does not seem to be a word we can apply comfortably to the future. For many, for all sorts of reasons, the prospect of the winter months will be a challenge. That may also be the case in our local communities. So let's take the word Harvest in its widest sense and see how it might apply to life around us.

Throughout the pandemic, there has been evidence of where we have 'harvested' in acts of kindness to friends and neighbours, with attempts to reach out to those who are isolated or who are in need of support, or even in the chat across the street with someone to whom you have never spoken before. Over the months, it seems that this has built up into a sense of sharing, and our communities have come closer together.

Our churches have tried to play a part in this. If we have been successful then we are carrying out what we believe God want us to do. In Matthew's Gospel, Jesus says, 'Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind. This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it: 'Love your neighbour as yourself.'

I ended my talk in church last Sunday with this quote: 'We need to remember two things: God loves us, and God wants us to welcome everyone. Indeed God loves us so much that he never stops looking out and at us. When we realise that truth, there will be a great party in heaven.'

If that last sentence is true, then I hope everyone up there enjoys it.

# The Royal British Legion Vale of Belyoir Branch

#### HM QUEEN ELIZABETH II 1926-2022

It is with deepest sorrow that members of the Royal British Legion mark the death of our Sovereign and Patron, Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II. The Queen has served as



Patron of the Royal British Legion since 6 February 1952. We are immensely thankful for Her Majesty's faithful service, and we join the entire Armed Forces community in mourning the loss of its Commander-in-Chief. The Queen attended her first performance of the Royal British Legion Festival of Remembrance as 19-year-old Princess Elizabeth in 1945, and only missed three occasions in her lifetime.

## REMEMBRANCE

Our Remembrance Service this year will be held at St Luke's Church, Kinoulton on Sunday 13 November commencing at 10.50am and will be followed by Wreath Laying at Kinoulton War Memorial. The pupils and staff of Kinoulton Primary School assemble at the Kinoulton War Memorial for their own Remembrance ceremony of wreath laying on Armistice Day 11 November at 10.50am.

#### POPPY APPEAL

The Poppy Appeal this year officially starts on 27 October and ends 11 November. Local static poppy sales boxes may appear before then at public locations, including The Nevile Arms, The Plough, The Wharf, Sarsfield's Tea Rooms and possibly more. Additionally, there will be house to house collections.

The Armed Forces community comprises around 10 million people including veterans and dependants. The Annual Appeal raises around £50 million to fund issues such as recovery and rehabilitation, post-traumatic stress disorder, support and advice for housing, employment, and financial worries. It funds Recovery Centres and Care Homes around the country. The Battle Back Centre at Lilleshall, founded in 2011, has helped more than 7,000 wounded and injured service personnel who served in Iraq and Afghanistan. The conflict in Ukraine is expected to provide further pressure on funds due to predicted rapidly rising fuel bills. The need for funding is relentless. Your donations and wearing a poppy for remembrance of the fallen will be very much appreciated.



### Update from Hickling Parish Council (Aug/Sept 2022)

Hickling Parish Council represents the interests of people living in Hickling and Hickling Pastures on all matters which impact directly on our community. We are committed to keeping you informed about our work. You can keep up to date with the latest news from Hickling Parish Council by following us on Facebook and Nextdoor or visiting our website (www.hicklingnotts.org/parish-council/) for notice of our upcoming meetings and minutes.

There has been one meeting since the last update; 9<sup>th</sup> August 2022 – Chris Lamb was co-opted as a new councillor. The meeting planned for September 13<sup>th</sup> was postponed following the sad news of the death of The Queen. The next meetings are due to be held on: 27<sup>th</sup> September, 25<sup>th</sup> October, 6<sup>th</sup> December.

## Abbreviated summary of the draft Minutes (9th August 2022): Public session:

- Melton Road, Hickling Pastures parishioner wished to discuss the substandard state of the carriageway repairs on A606 Melton Road, Hickling Pastures and the associated ongoing problems
- John Brooks Sawmill parishioners raised serious concerns regarding the level of dust currently
  produced by the facility and whether this dust was detrimental to health.
- Air Ambulance Heliport, Hickling Pastures parishioners, while supporting the work of the air ambulance service and its residency at the heliport, posed questions about their operations.
- The Old Wharf, Main Street a parishioner noted that the latest Old Wharf planning application had been withdrawn and suggested that the Parish Council should now request a full planning review be carried out by Rushcliffe Borough Council. Cllr Combellack also raised concerns about possible planning breaches and parking on Main Street.

#### Planning Matters:

- No objections were raised for; 22/01318/FUL replacement of render to front, sides and rear The Byre, Main Street; 21/02977/FUL convert garage into office including raise roof height and alterations to fenestrations. Home Farm, Main Street, 21/01271/FUL proposed front extension to dwelling (amendment to 21/02166/FUL) to increase length by 400mm due to an underground electric cable) Hillside Cottage, Melton Road; 22/01406/FUL construction of new field stables building with rolled stone entrance, turning, car parking (2 spaces) and new drop kerb access land Northwest off Bridgegate Lane Hickling Pastures; 22/01213/FUL proposed two storey side extension includes side porch Fairholme 1 Main Street
- F/4436 John Brookes Sawmill, off the A46, Nr Widmerpool. NG12 5PS southern extension to the
  waste wood and green waste storage yard (part retrospective) Electronic Consultation for John
  Brookes Sawmill, off the A46, Nr Widmerpool. NG12 5PS F/4436 Joel Marshall
  development.management@nottscc.gov.uk; Please note this is on NCC website. Also, planning
  officer will be seeking more clarity on the drainage and surfacing details. Object unanimous
  - Cllr Brown advised that he had spoken with parishioners in Hickling Pastures who had
    expressed serious concerns about the level of dust being produced by the facility and the
    increase in airborne litter.
  - The Parish Council object to this application on the following grounds:- excessive dust produced by the plant (have occupational limits been measured by Environmental Health?)- is this dust detrimental to health, insufficient measures in place to contain dust pollution or to reduce airborne dust produced by the plant. Increased spread of litter- the current storage arrangements for waste wood, pallets etc. are not working and a considerable amount of litter is spread by the wind (generally in the direction of Hickling Pastures).

Application Withdrawn: 22/00398/FUL - proposed change of use of the site area for the mooring of a wide beamed canal boat for additional seating for existing tea room. Extension of car park and provision of bike parking - Old Wharf Building Adjacent Wharf House, Main Street, Hickling, Melton Mowbray, Nottinghamshire. LE14 3AJ.

The withdrawal of this application was noted and welcomed by the Parish Council. The Council again wished it minuted that it does support the presence of the business at the Old Wharf but that it considers that the business has outgrown its location. A full review of the planning history of the site was discussed and action agreed as follows:

Clerk – to write to Kath Marriott, Chief Executive of Rushcliffe Borough Council, & cc'd to Matt Hilton and the Planning Department, requesting a full and thorough planning review to ascertain what applications were still outstanding, what work had been carried out by the applicant without planning permission or not in accordance with conditions specified in approved applications, and specifically for an in-depth review of the car parking arrangements, the recent resurfacing work carried out by the applicant, the exponential and uncontrolled increase in the number of tables and seating, the addition of the pergola / covered seating area, the green storage area constructed to the

rear of the plot and the noticeable reduction in designated green space.

Clirs Prosser, Playle & Lane - to produce collaborative supporting document/report for transmission to Rushcliffe Borough Council, subject to review & agreement by Councillors.

#### Finance and Administration - Cllr Prosser

- Lengthman Scheme associated paper circulated to all councillors prior to the meeting and discussed with Cllr Clarke at the meeting.
- Housing Needs Assessment Hickling and Upper Broughton it was agreed that the Parish Council
  are happy for Midland Rural Housing (Ginz Kelai) to carry out a survey to ascertain the current
  housing requirements in the Parish.
- Neighbourhood Watch Cllr Prosser advised that a new Neighbourhood Watch Scheme had been set up—parishioners should make contact with her to register. Cllr Prosser has a plentiful supply of window / door stickers for distribution and is happy to drop these off with residents.
- Cllr Combellack asked the Parish Council to consider including the Wharf's wider area (the basin, towpath etc.) as an Asset of Community Value.

#### Environment - Clirs Lane and Playle

 Breaches of Weight Restrictions, Hickling – associated paper circulated to all councillors prior to the meeting. Response received from Laura Trussler, Senior District Manager, Via East Midlands Ltd, in response to parishioners concerns re. regular breaches of weight restrictions in Hickling village, County Cllr Clarke shared details of the Notts County Council's Lorry Watch scheme, where the public could report vehicles contravening weight restrictions on the Notts County Council's website.

## Highways and Street Furniture - Cllrs Green and Playle

Plaques for WI black poplar and the Jubilee tree on Walkers' Green; Cllr Lane to obtain quotes.

#### Assets - Clirs Prosser and Adlam

- Walkers' Green inspections CIIr Lane agreed to assist with these weekly inspections.
- Springer damage ROSPA Annual Inspection identified naturally occurring cracks in the wood but had not considered the equipment to be dangerous or a high risk. The Council agreed to allow the springer to remain in use but to contact the manufacturer for comment.
- Repairs to parish benches only one quote received in the amount of £156.08 agreed to proceed.
- Parish Risk Assessment outstanding matters Walkers' Green gate Cllr Lane to saw off the
  excess protruding bolts. Cemetery trees and invasive ivy one quote received agreed to proceed.
- · Cemetery gate repairs expected to proceed in September.
- · Cemetery tree survey to be carried out by Cllrs Playle and Prosser
- Noticeboard, Main Street / Clawson Lane junction considered dangerous & will be removed.

## Community Engagement - CIIr Adlam.

New Hickling parish Council website – Cllr Adlam recommended a package by Netwise UK - set-up fee of £599.00, an annual fee of £330.00. It was agreed to seek two further quotes and to seek grant funding for the setting up costs.

**Community Survey** – Clir Adlam reported that the survey was now ready for distribution to all households in September. To be collated in November ready for budget-setting in January.

Hickling Pastures community engagement – Cllr Brown reported that he had made contact with all Hickling Pastures residents since the last meeting, to introduce himself and to establish any areas of concern.

- · The repairs to the A606 Melton Road and the general speed of traffic were areas of concern.
- The Air Ambulance was also an area of concern, specifically flight paths, flight times, routes, low-level flying, noise and general disturbance Cllr Lamb to seek further information and report back at the next meeting. Clerk to invite a representative from the Air Ambulance to attend the next meeting.
- Cllr Brown also raised planning application 21/00432/FUL for the continued mixed farm and forestry
  use of part of farm yard for logging enterprise (retrospective), land at Hickling Pastures. The Parish
  Council submitted their comments to the Borough Council on 31<sup>st</sup> March.

## Ward Member Reports

- Cllr Combellack was pleased to report that 100% of the Council Tax rebate had been paid by Rushcliffe Borough Council to qualifying residents, ahead of the September deadline.
- Water in the Grantham Canal she was also pleased to report that the current agreement between RBC and the Canal and River Trust was being reassessed. Currently the Borough Council have responsibility for looking after the canal towpath and are now considering looking after the water/loss of water in the canal.
- Crime and Community Safety Fund Cllr Combellack reminded the Parish Council that this funding
  was still available for projects such as Village Gateways, which had been an area of interest for the
  Council historically. Councillors advised that they were awaiting the results of the Community
  Survey, which would identify areas of future spending and associated funding requirements.
