The Coronation Service will take place on the morning of Saturday, 6th May 2023 at Westminster Abbey. The King and The Queen Consort will arrive at Westminster Abbey in procession from Buckingham Palace, after the Service, Their Majesties will return to Buckingham Palace in a



larger ceremonial procession, known as 'The Coronation Procession'. Their Majesties will be joined in this procession by other Members of the Royal Family. At Buckingham Palace, The King and The Queen Consort, accompanied by Members of the Royal Family, will appear on the balcony to conclude the day's ceremonial events.

Sunday 7th May 2023

The Coronation Big Lunch; Neighbours and communities across the United Kingdom are invited to share food and fun together at Coronation Big Lunches on Sunday 7th May 2023, in a nationwide act of celebration and friendship. From a cup of tea with a neighbour to a street party, a Coronation Big Lunch brings the celebrations to your neighbourhood and is a great way to get to know your community a little better.

The Coronation Big Lunch will be overseen and organised by the Big Lunch team at the Eden Project. The Big Lunch is an idea from the Eden Project, made possible by The National Lottery, that brings millions of people together annually to boost community spirit, reduce loneliness and support charities and good causes. Her Majesty The Queen Consort has been Patron of the Big Lunch since 2013. On Sunday evening at the Methodist church a coronation service was held, and there was Holy Communion at the parish church on coronation morning."

70 years since the Coronation of Queen Elizabeth II On the 2nd of June 1953 at Westminster Abbey.

It was a rainy day in 1953 when Hickling celebrated the Coronation with a fancy dress parade, tea and entertainments but the sports events were postponed until the following weekend when they were held in the Manor Field. (Grantham Journal): "Apart from postponing the children's sports until the week-end, the day's programme was held. The

fancy dress parade entries assembled in the Wharf Yard and over 50 walked in procession. Each child who did not win a prize received a shilling. Prizewinners were: Mary Richardson (Coronation Rosette), Margaret Speed (fairy),



Dr Lucy Jocelyn Burnett

We started from a simple mention of a Dr Burnett in a



newspaper cutting about Hickling - no details of who Dr Burnett was but we were researching the Burnett family and business, so some further checking was done to make sure there was no family connection. Serendipitously, the next reference we found changed things completely; 'he took as Partner Dr. Burnett a lady, well that put the cat among the pigeons, it was the first time anyone local had anything to do with a Lady Doctor'

- Village Doctor &, from the various news reports, paramedic, too
- Famously, the owner of a little terrier named Christopher
- & just as famously—rider of a motorbike and driver of a sports car

Working from Colston Bassett Dr Lucy Burnett was a general medical practitioner whose work took her to villages across the Vale of Belvoir and, after the initial surprise, was viewed very fondly!

Grantham Journal August 3rd 1935. "Presentation. An interesting event took place at The Rectory on Tuesday when Mrs Foster and Miss Pinchbeck who had canvassed the village and the pastures for subscriptions, presented to Dr Burnett, the lady assistant to Dr Woolward, who is leaving the district, a cheque in appreciation of her services. Dr Burnett is highly respected and her departure is regretted."

(Maggie's Memories p.59) After Dr. Windley retired at Colston Bassett, Dr. Woolward took the practise, he was a younger man and a favourite with everybody, he was tall and very good looking, he took as Partner Dr. Burnett a lady, well that put the cat among the pigeons, it was the first time anyone local had anything to do with a Lady Doctor, but after a while she became a welcome visitor, she was a tiny slip of a thing she rode a motor cycle and her little dog rode on a special carrier always barking its head off. Dr. Burnett also had a fast sports car, I remember Slater Shelton fetching her when his eldest son was born, there had been a heavy storm and the roads were flooded, so Slater went along to Colston Bassett on his horse called Daisy and Dr. Burnett joined him on Daisy's back to come back to Hickling through the floods and deliver young John Shelton. When Dr. Woolward and his family left Colston Bassett, Dr. Burnett went along with them and Dr. Roche came, he was older, a good Doctor, and he stayed until his retirement.

(Maggie's Memories p.39) The Welfare Clinic has been held in the Sunday school since it first started (and still is) and that is forty one year's this year of 1976, and why I know, it was the year when Keith was born and he was only a few weeks old when the opening clinic took place, and I always say the Clinic, Cow & Gate Food, and Dr. Burnett (lady Dr. from Colston B.) saved his life, he was a poor little mite.

(cont'd) Lucy Jocelyn Burnett sounds like an extraordinary woman – she trained as a doctor at a time when this would have been very unusual; unusually, she worked in a rural practice; she (and her dog) rode a motorbike and drove a sports car; newspaper reports describe her place firmly at the 'business end' of the work. Anecdotes and news reports, despite the initial surprise, also show that she was much-loved and well respected.


Lucy Jocelyn Burnett was born in 1901 in Southampton; her father was a stockbroker and the family seem to have been prosperous. Her elder sister, Ellinor Marjorie Burnett also trained in medicine and became a house surgeon at the Royal Surrey Hospital. In 1921 Lucy Burnett is a medical student at the University of London and, by 1927, she is settled in a rural practice in the household of Dr Arthur Woolward in Colston Bassett – she is only 26 at this time. Their practice is based at The Yews, Colston Bassett – a property long associated with successive doctors in the village and their surgery would have been at the house. From here they ran clinics, were called out to patients around all the neighbouring villages in the Vale of Belvoir and, according to newspaper reports, they did the work we now associate with paramedics, too (frequently being first on the scene of accidents and tragedies; in 1932 she is called to a child scalded by boiling water and immediately drives her straight to the children's hospital in Nottingham).



Dr Lucy Burnett had a very distinctive style of her own; she did her rounds on a motorbike or in her sports car. Either way, she was always accompanied by her terrier, Christopher – best known for his barking and for winding up the village dogs as they passed. When Dr Burnett made her house calls, he would sit outside waiting for her to return. Christopher would ride pillion or in a basket on the motorbike and sometimes, it is reported, on the bonnet of the car – the sound of his barking was a sure sign that the doctor was on her way. She worked closely with the village communities that she served; running clinics and serving as



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(cont'd) President of the Cropwell Bishop WI. Accounts of her riding with a farmer on horseback through floods to deliver his child in the middle of the night, give a sense of her character and resolve.

Although she only lived and worked in the area for 8 years she made her mark; remarkably, she was only 26 when she first came to Colston Bassett and just 34 when she moved on. A hint of the difficulties she may have faced as a woman in this role can be found in newspaper cuttings which often refer to her as 'he' – an

unconscious expectation that any doctor must be male

In 1935, she and Dr Woolward moved to Clive in Shropshire (where his wife's family lived) and she remained practising medicine in the area for the rest of her career. Much of this time, she lived in the Elephant and Castle Hotel in Clive – she never married. Dr Burnett died in 1972.

Headmaster's log book: 1876-1897

(one of our volunteers is currently transcribing the logbook which is full of the most fascinating snapshots of village life-in the meantime, a short extract)

(May 23rd 1877) Opened school this morning. Attendance very poor - only about 1/3 of the children present. I am told that this is a great week for cowslipping & the making of cowslip wine that being true it would be better in subsequent years to give one week's holidays instead of two days.

(May 28th 1877) There are only 87 present this morning, Near all, who by age, are beyond the powers of the Board are absent owing to home work.

1844 May 23 Opened school this morning. Attendance very poor - only about 3 of the children present. Surprise, surprise, for soon he noted


Another little house for pigs, And this one had been built of TWIGS!

Letter from St Luke's

Dear All,

We seem to make Christmas the centre of our joy for the year. Jesus' birth was wonderful, and marked the work of God in freeing us from our past limitations, but the most important and transformational act of God took place at Easter. Without the death and resurrection of Jesus we would be condemned to a world without hope, where all that is evil in us and the world around us would weigh us down. Palm Sunday 2nd April at Upper Broughton Church

Is the time we remember Jesus riding into Jerusalem on the back of a donkey and crowds of people welcoming him with shouts of Hosanna and the waving of palm branches. To celebrate this story the three St Luke's Churches will be joining together for a short walk to church. Good Friday 7th April

To remind us of this journey and sacrifice Jesus undertook for us all, there will be a Walk of Faith from St Luke's Church at Upper Broughton to St Luke's at Hickling and then along the footpath to St Luke's Kinoulton. TOWN & PARISH FORUM UPDATE

Having just left the above event I give you a quick overview of what was a very interesting and informative forum.

The leader opened saying that the Parish and Town Council are so important in making Rushcliffe what it is, living up to the Rushcliffe strap line "A Great Place, Great Lifestyle, Great Sport"

Carbon Clever - Rushcliffe country park visitor centre is net Zero and Rushcliffe re support 3 Parish councils on their journey to Zero impact.

Devolution consultation – showed a majority in favour. We are assured that Rushcliffe as a debt free council will remain independent and no be subsidising the other councils, which are in debt, which was reassuring.

UKSPF grant funding – this in effect replaces the European leader funding and amounts to £2.5 million over 3 years

Community, groups and Parishes are invited to apply for the fund the investment priorities being Communities and place, Business support, and people & skills with emphasis on green and blue spaces, events, and participatory programmes where improvements have to be seen.

THE GCWRG The Grantham Canal Water Restoration Group bid via Canal and River Trust was already on the table and ready to roll, hence we have seen the very immediate response to our bid. There is a deadline of 19th May for bids but more information will be published, maybe later today. There is also a webinar at the end of March.

Community Safety and Rural Crime. Rushcliffe's 158 square miles is largely rural hence our emphasis on rural policing. The message is we must have more confidence in our police that they are doing something and ring 111 or 999 with the slightest suspicious incident.

Rushcliffe South Villages Community Safety Group RCVSG, which I attend regulalary, is an independent body challenging the police and councils regarding their priorities, figures and patrols. It involves RBC, Police, Parish Councils and Neighbourhood Watch. We need more input from the Parish Councils and invite a PC representative to attend each meeting. You could make a difference. Communication is the key to crime reduction.

Envirocrime

John Dunne from **WISE** (Waste investigations, support and enforcement) Ran through compliance and enforcement procedures. Areas of responsibility Littering, dog fouling, fly tipping, waste on private land investigation, Household responsibility, business waste inspections, commercial waste bins, domestics waste bins, waste carriers, highways offences, fly posting and much more.

In the last 6 months there have issued 168 penalties, and 70 fines totalling £67,000

HISTORY CHEST

What a find – Upper Broughton have unearthed a chest full of very old and historic records that are being uploaded to their History Web site. I was thrilled, loving the history of villages, to offer a grant from my Community fund to help.

Sadly, I have to tell you that the Councillors

have had their funding halved in order to help protect front line services at Rushcliffe. I have helped with so many worthwhile community requests in the past.

TREES

Rushcliffe has now planted over 11,000 trees throughout the Borough but, as I keep saying, 'we have to look after the trees', those already planted, but particularly the young ones.

Water is vital in those early years. Perhaps residents could adopt a tree in their area to look

after, particularly in hot, dry summers – just a thought.

PLANT MORE TREES is the message from Woodland trust.

'They're one of our best defences against the climate crisis, our vital emergency response that helps to lock up carbon and keep our planet healthy for people and wildlife'.

CORONATION WOOD A resident of Kinoulton is planning to plant a

5 acre Coronation Wood with 2/3000 Native broadleaf, fruit and conifer trees, part of the Greenwood, Trees for Climate Scheme.

IVY - friend or foe

(cont'd) high winds recently. The canopy had become burdened with Ivy which caught the wind. It is permitted to cut ivy away from the tree at a convenient point, usually at the base, not killing the ivy but pruning it

RUSHCLIFFE COUNCIL TAX – to remain the same for bands A-D . D+ will see a 2% increase.

RURAL CRIME – We held a meeting with farmers and landowners plus police and the Borough Council at Oddhouse Farm, Owthorpe. The police set out their plans for monitoring Rural Crime. Mobile CCTV cameras have been set up to monitor Anti Social behaviour helping keep streets safer but will also help in tracking suspicious vehicles providing on-going intelligence. Remember to report any suspicious vehicle or incident no matter how minor - ring 999 or 111. It may be part of a pattern.

The Neighbourhood Officers are committed to visiting all farmers in the area over the course of the coming months to talk about security and concerns regarding criminal activity.

To keep up to date with safety advice and crime in your area go to alert@neighbourhoodalert.co.uk and sign up to Rushcliffe Farm Watch to view and publicise suspicious activity BUT STILL REPORT ON 999 or 101. If you wish to join Farm Watch contact Jo McOuat on 07790846111

Fly tipping - since the Borough have engaged 'WISE' we have increased enforcement notices to 3000, brought prosecutions and crushed vehicles.

The WISE contract - 'Waste Investigations Support & Enforcement (WISE) will provide Environmental Enforcement Services with regards to the investigation of all submitted dumped waste complaints and enforcement against the offences of littering, dog fouling, fly tipping and household duty of care. The WISE waste enforcement team will also complete routine waste inspections on businesses across the borough and issue notices to businesses who cannot provide a copy of waste transfer notes'.

DOG FOULING the perennial issue - with the lighter nights and spring weather we have seen the return of dog fouling on many village streets, play areas and canal towpaths. There are also lazy dog owners who seem to think village residents are 'Dog Poo fairies" and will pick up their pretty poo bags – pink purple, yellow, white and green, decorating hedge rows, walls and trees. Leaving them is just further litter in the countryside and falls under the WISE enforcement contract - BAG IT, TIE IT, BIN IT.

BINGHAM ARENA – As Mayor, I opened the Bingham Leisure centre. It is a wonderful purpose built amenity, with great gym facilities, dance studios, and pool providing lessons, lane swimming and public sessions. There is a very well equipped community hall with stage and lighting plus projection facilities and fully equipped kitchen. I can't wait to see a school play or concert there. All the infrastructure is directed towards low carbon impact and energy conservation. There is also an enterprise zone offering fully serviced offices with a rolling 6 monthly rental scheme. If you are looking to open a business this is the place to be. Rushcliffe have done a wonderful job in very difficult times, during and following Covid.

Summary of minutes from meetings held on 10th Jan, 24th Jan and 28th Feb (draft) Full Minutes are published on Parish Noticeboards and at https://hicklingnotts.org/parish-council/)

Raised by parishioners:

- (10/1) Parishioner asked for the Minutes of the December Meeting to be changed to make clear that the proposed ACV (Asset of Community Value) application will not include the area occupied by the Faulks business.
- (10/1) Parish Survey: a query was raised about the deadline for replies and the difficulty of using the Village Hall to return forms when the Pre-School occupy the VH on weekdays. Cllr lane reported that he had received several replies including 15 from the Village Hall. The deadline was fixed for the end of January 2023 (to be advertised by the Clerk).
- Several parishioners from Hickling pastures attended the meeting hoping to speak to representatives from The Heliport and the Air Ambulance about their concerns; it was understood that both organisations had accepted invitations to attend this meeting but they were not in attendance. Residents' concerns were discussed and it was agreed to renew the invitations for the meeting in February.
 - ♦ Parishioner said that had experienced the rattling windows at their property when the Air Ambulance comes over so low. Another parishioner said that the return flight seems to come back around 9.30/10pm, which is not following the flight path, they should follow the railway line (not over properties). It appears that the Air Ambulance is stationed somewhere else in the day. Parishioner says it goes towards Tollerton direction. ClIr Lane has contacted Castle Donnington Parish Council to ask their advice with regards to aviation law and the Air Ambulance should be stationed near where they are based. A parishioner asked about the additional hangers, and ClIr Combellack said that there was a planning application for further hangers, but nothing mentioned about the flights.
- (24/1) The History group has a website separate to the Parish Council; the work is carried out by
 volunteers but there are basic costs of approx.. £250pa. The Hickling History Group's request for
 support in funding their website was discussed: a grant of £300 for the financial years-ending
 31.03.2024, 31.03.25 & 31.03.2026 and agreed unanimously (the Parish Council had already paid
 £150 to the History Group in 22/23).
- (24/1) Parishioner requested the Parish Council to apply pressure on Highways to meet to discuss
 the traffic and parking problems around the Wharf and Basin and to push for the previously
 requested full traffic survey.
- (24/1) Parishioner referred to two recent retrospective planning applications (The Brambles and The Cottage) and asked that the Parish Council be consistent in its approach with all retrospective applications that are received.
- (24/1) Parishioner asked the Parish Council what it is going to do with the £15,000 funding that it
 has and why can't the PC fund the entire magazine (The Standard), as Langar do, as it did not want
 to be like Upper Broughton and ask Parishioners to pay for the magazine. Clerk handed out the
 Budget and Precept information copies to advise the Parishioner that the £15,000 is accounted for,
 and that £3,000 of the amount mentioned had been historically put aside for various items around
 the Parish. Parishioner would like the Parish Council to consider a grant of £500 per year for 23/24,
 24/25 & 25/26 unanimously agreed.
- (28/2) Cllr Lane asked if any parishioners were attending for any other reason apart from the Heliport, none were, so the open session began with the gentlemen from Central Helicopters and the Air Ambulance. Dan explained that the Heliport was a family run business that was started in 2014, they do training flights, and the Air Ambulance is stationed there, he explained that he had attended the meeting to answer questions. Phil from Air Ambulance then introduced himself, since 2021 he has held the position of head of operations, he used to be stationed at East Midlands airport, now at Widmerpool. There are two aircraft that cover Derby, Leicester, and Rutland, re mutual aid can go into Lancaster.
- ♦ Central Helicopters provide flights, training sessions, and pleasure flights, only 2/3 per day go from the Heliport.
- ♦ Q Parishioner asked their flight path as per planning authorisation.
- ♦ A have a circuit plan, stay on train line, circular area, red circular area towards Hickling Pastures. Traffic coming from a different area joins the circuit at some point, will avoid unnecessary flights over the area. Unforeseen circumstances might be for example due to weather conditions which means that there are slight changes to the flight path. Aircraft might come in on a divert, you will see other traffic over the area which is nothing to do with the Heliport. When Air Ambulance is on an emergency flight, they don't have to stick to the flight exceptions. Rushcliffe Borough Council have said that the flight paths do not apply to the Air Ambulance. The training flights operate in a designated within the permitted areas which is circular pattern, no further than Hickling Pastures avoiding the red shaded area on the flight plan.
- Q Parishioner asked about a flight that is coming over her house at 9.30pm each Sunday night.

- A This is not one of our flights, as we do not fly at night.
- O How many emergency flights are there a day.
- A On average 3 per day. Air Ambulance will fly northwest as it approaches the Heliport, and try and join the flight path as soon as possible, depending on weather conditions.300 metres from the shaded area, flight plan area.
- Q I have video evidence that do not stick to flight path.
- A there is a lady who lives at the top of the test track who complains if the aircraft are over her house. If south westly wind would not want to approach that way.
- Q None of the houses at Hickling Pastures are nearer.
- O What time is classed as after dark.
- ♦ A Half an hour after sunset, sometimes the Air Ambulance would come back after dark from an emergency.
- O My windows rattle at night, what is the best way to engage with you to ask if they are your pilots.
- A Ring.
- Q Could some parishioners visit heliport, could you share your info with us.
- ♦ A We will not go through our flight plans to give you what flights have been made as it is public information, you can find out when made and flight path.
- Q If you want support from Hickling Pastures, you will give us the information. Cllr Rowe asked if he could meet with Dan and Phil with some parishioners at the Heliport.
- ♦ A Yes, happy to meet up, heliport was set up in 2014 and flights have decreased by 1/3 since moved in, we have a new hanger which a few people complained about the application, but we wanted it for helicopter maintenance / storage of helicopters.
- CIIr Lamb advised that the Air Ambulance tracks all their flights and agreed all information is there regarding flights for parishioners to access if they wished.
- 22/02/120/FUL: the erection of five new residential dwellings (Use Class C3), and associated landscaping and highways works Land South of Bridegate Lane, Hickling Pastures. The Parish Council would look favourably upon development on this site if its concerns were addressed; however, they object on a number of grounds including over-development, over-looking of neighbours, lack of detail for foul drainage, concerns about access and turning for vehicles, conflict with the Neighbourhood and Local Plans.
- 22/00545/VAR: Variation of Condition 2 (Approved plans) of planning permission 21/00052/FUL with regards to the design and height of the single-storey rear extension The Brambles Main Street Hickling. The owners of The Brambles attended the meeting and explained the circumstances behind the application. Parish Council no comment.
- 22/02035/FUL: Erection of new two storey dwelling, Willow House, Melton Road, Hickling Pastures application withdrawn 16th December 2022.
- 22/01907/FUL: (revised) To retain existing open sided covered area, bin store and permeable surfacing, Old Wharf Tea Rooms Main Street Hickling. Four parishioners had emailed their objections prior to the meeting. Cllr Playle explained that the grass matting that is proposed around the seating area is generally used for car parking, as it makes the ground stable for vehicles. Historically we have objected to the proposed changes. It is a major problem with the number of covers and the number of parking spaces. It is important that this area is returned to the open green space, which was there prior to the overdevelopment of the site, therefore, the Parish Council would like to see the removal of the covered seating area, the seating, and the bin store. All councillors agreed to object.
- There is a second retrospective application for the Wharf, an extension has been granted until the 28th March, so this will be on the agenda regarding the windows at the Wharf.
- Cllr Cottee advised that he had contacted Nottingham County Council asking them to carry out a
 traffic survey, and he had passed this to a parishioner and copied the Clerk into the email, he had
 received an update on 21st February to say that they are still waiting for comments.
- 22/02120/FUL: Development comprising the erection of five new residential dwellings (Use Class C3), and associated landscaping and highways works, Land South Of Bridegate Lane, Hickling Pastures application withdrawn 27th Jan.
- 22/01793/FUL: Proposed new field stables building with rolled stone entrance, turning, car parking (2 spaces), Land Off Bridegate Lane, Hickling Pastures Decision: Grant Planning Permission. 22/00619/RELDEM & 22/00604/FUL: Demolition of industrial buildings, Land South West of Wharf
- House, Main Street, Hickling. Decision: Grant planning permission.
- Ward Member report: (10/1) Cllr Combellack advised that the consultation on devolution ended yesterday. Regarding the Hickling Standard, Cllr Combellack suggested that the committee contacts other parish council magazines committees to see how they are funded (the committee had already done this combination of advertising, subscription and Parish Council funding. The Hickling newsletter is mainly funded by the cost of the advertising within the magazine, however when they have increased their cost previously they have lost advertisers).
- increased their cost previously they have lost advertisers).

 (28/2) Cllr Combellack reported that the levelling up fund for special projects had donated £100,000 for reed clearance in the Canal. Also that there is a Rural England Fund as well as the UKSPF (Special Projects Fund), if further information is required regarding this the person to contact is

cevans@rushcliffe.gov.uk. No increase in council tax for band A-D properties over D 2% increase. Green Waste fee has been frozen, as has car parking fees. Bingham Leisure Centre was opened on 28th Feb, they have a community hall with a stage, there is an enterprise area for start up companies, the lease is a rolling 6 months, these are eco-friendly. Rural Crime Meeting was held, disappointed that local farmers did not attend.

Fly tipping, a new agency has been appointed and has issued over 3,000 enforcement notices. We must all report any fly tipping / crimes by either ringing 111 or if emergency 999.

Finance & Assets:

(10/1) Defibrillator site checks completed, costs approved - £318.00

(24/1) The Clerk read out the following email received from Cllr Prosser prior to going through the financial documents: -

"We need to try to prevent the current trend of overspending and therefore must get much better at seeking and securing any / all grants available if we are to agree to this reasonably conservative budget ... the alternative is obviously to seek a higher % precept if we are to continue to support our local parish community groups and to support the Village Hall and St Luke's Church which benefit so many residents. Bearing in mind the current 'cost of living' crisis and the impact that this is having on our community groups, I would recommend a higher % precept in order to maximise the precept application and to negate the level of overspend. Our budget details annual projected expenditure for 23/24 of £15,455.00 - we cannot clearly make an application for the full amount as this would be deemed excessive, but I would suggest seeking as high a precept as Councillors are comfortable with (15 - 20%). Even with a 15% precept of £10051 we would still currently be £404.00 adrift and this would have to be funded by grants if we are to achieve a balanced budget. A 20% precept of £10488 would leave a deficit of £4967.00."

 The budget for Hickling Parish Council for the year 1st April 2023 to 31st March 2024 and the Precept to Rushcliffe Borough Council in respect of the financial year 1st April 2023 to 31st March 2024 to meet the expenses payable by the Council were approved.

• Five scenarios were discussed; increases in precept at 4%/8%/12%/15%/20%. Councillors agreed

to recommend a 15% increase in precept.

(28/2) Cllr Prosser wanted to reiterate her views regarding the current financial situation, budget review of 22/23, proposed budget for 23/24 and the precept setting for 23/24 that had been read out by the Clerk, in her absence, at the Extraordinary Meeting on the 24th January. She wished to remind councillors that the 23/24 budget agreed at that meeting was in excess of current anticipated income, even with a 15% precept application. She advised that grant funding would need to be sought to cover any capital expenditure so that the Parish Council could continue to support local parish community groups in the coming year. Regarding current ringfenced monies, Cllr Prosser advised that the Parish Council would need to seek approval from relevant donor organisations if they wished to reallocate any of these monies, i.e., grants received from Rushcliffe Borough Council or Nottingham County Council.

(28/2) Assets of Community Value; information circulated in associated paper prior to the meeting. Cllr Prosser advised that the Plough Inn's asset of community value listing expires in June 2023 and suggested that this be renewed/reapplied for. With regard to the Wharf and the surrounding canal basin area, it was agreed that this application be referred to a sub-committee/steering group to be

made up of Cllr Lamb, Cllr Prosser and a volunteer parishioner.

(28/2) Elections; information from NALC circulated in associated paper prior to the meeting. If councillors wish to remain on the Parish Council, paperwork to be with the clerk by 20.3.23, or they can take to RBC by hand before 4pm on the 04.04.23. If any members of the public wish to join the Parish Council please contact the clerk or look on the RBC website for the application form, parishioners can take their own paperwork to RBC by 4pm on 04.04.23.

(28/2) Standing Orders; information circulated in associated paper prior to the meeting. The members of the Parish Council agreed to the addition of the NALC paragraph to be added to the

existing Standing Orders.

Environment: (10/1) Roadside verges update. Cllr Playle has spoken to the Nottingham County Council ecologist, Cllr Playle will contact the parishioners who have been maintaining the areas and will cc Cllr John Cottee in on any correspondence with NCC.

(10/1) A Parishioner mentioned that there is a problem with a dip in the road by the Orchard – Cllr

Cottee contacted and the following reply has been received:

NCC Senior Compliance Inspector has raised this with STW as a defect under consequential
damage and asked for a further investigation. Via Drainage Manager has confirmed that our
Drainage Team have had no previous involvement and no outstanding jobs, he has also raised it
with the Severn Trent Water Catchment Leads, whilst STW may have checked their foul system,
there are two surface water sewers also, one directly underneath the area of damage by the look
of it (map included).

(28/2) Cllr Playle updated the council on the Roadside verges, at Widermpool some verges have

been cut, he was advised that a cut would be done end of January, however this did not happen. On the Southern side part cut has been done, but not completely. Northern side has not been cut for 4/5yrs. Unfortunately, there has been fly tipping on Bridegate Lane, tried to phone it through, ended up having to email it though. Bagged it up and put it on Clawson Lane, rubbish was then picked up by Streetwise.

Highways & Street Furniture:

Cemetery: denotation of unconsecrated area of parish cemetery update looked at by Cllr Playle; estimated cost of materials would be approx. £70.00. Councillors agreed that this should proceed. Cemetery maintenance: Cllr Playle raised concerns that only one of the four companies approached quoted for the 3 year cemetery maintenance tender; the Parish Council had received a letter with critical comments regarding the state of the Cemetery from a company that had declined to quote. The correspondent was of the opinion that the Parish Council should improve oversight of the maintenance of the cemetery and hopefully companies in the future will want to work for the Parish Council. Cllr Prosser asked if any other members of the Parish Council would like to get involved with the maintenance side as she felt that Cllr Playle and Cllr Lane would have knowledge regarding the upkeep due to their line of work. Cllr Playle and Cllr Lane agreed to meet to look at the Cemetery. Cllr Prosser reminded the Parish Council that the maintenance contract is due to be renewed on the 31st March, and it was agreed that it would be an agenda item for March.

Walkers' Green Weekly inspections: Walkers' Green Inspections need to be done each week.

Community Engagement:

(10/1) New website - progress update. Cllr Green is waiting for the company for an update, they

will be supplying email addresses for the members of the parish council.

(10/1) King Charles III Coronation – update re. wrought-iron plaques. ClIr Lane has spoken to a parishioner with regards to this, also ClIr Combellack has said that there are a lot of companies advertising plaques on the internet. (28/2) Was suggested that a wrought iron plaque was produced to mark the Coronation, a parishioner has said that he would be able to produce a plaque - ClIr Lane will investigate this within the week, as a request for the grant needs to be in by 14th March.

(28/2) Cllr Lamb said out of the 250 questionnaires circulated only 12 were sent back, main issues raised were parking at the Wharf and the traffic congestion around the Wharf. Parishioners would like to see improvement and establishment of the green spaces. What would you like to find out more about – Planning applications and Community events, a parishioner asked if flyers could be dropped through letterboxes regarding meetings – as not everyone has an electronic device to

access websites.

(28/2) Community Speed Watch - associated paper was circulated prior to the meeting, this item had previously been discussed. Cllr Lane advised the Parish Council that he had attended a recent training session and a Chairman for another Parish Council had purchased a speed gun and which was calibrated by the Police for a fraction of the cost that the Community Speed Watch quote for equipment – total quoted is £450. It has been suggested by Upper Broughton Parish Council that it could be split three ways, if Hickling and Kinoulton Parish Council divided this quote, so it would be £150 each Parish Council. Cllr Playle felt that speeding is an issue through Main Street. Clerk explained that Upper Broughton's scheme is being run by three volunteers and this is the suggested that Parishioners run this group, not the Parish Council. A parishioner said that they would be interested in joining the group. The members of the Parish Council voted and decided to defer this item. to another agenda, clerk to advise the clerk of Upper Broughton that Hickling will not get involved in scheme at the moment.

(28/2) Another matter relating to traffic issues and resulting in major disruption is the regular hunts that disrupt the local community. The congestion resulting in inconsiderate hunt followers is

becoming a major issue.

Correspondence:

(28/2) Conservation Area Review: meeting arranged - email was passed to a member of the History group who is going to attend, unfortunately no one else has shown interest in attending. Meeting is being held on Wed 8th March at 9am at the Wharf, Cllr Prosser will also attend. (28/2) Defibrillator Training. Clerk had been contacted by a member of the WI asking if the Parish Council could arrange this training and asking the Parish Council to fund this; training is carried out by East Midlands Ambulance Service in return for a donation to Vale First responders. A donation of £50 was agreed. The training session to take place on Thursday 16th March.

Other items: None.

In order to become a Parish Councillor you will need to meet one of the following criteria:

- . Be a local government elector of the Parish (registered to vote).
- Have, during the whole for the 12 months preceding the day on which he/she was nominated as
 a councillor, occupied as tenant or owner, any land or other premises in the Parish.
- His/her principal or only place of work in the 12 months preceding the day on which he/she is nominated as a councillor has been in the area of the Parish.
- Have resided either in the Parish or within three miles thereof during the whole of the 12 months
 preceding the day on which he/she is nominated as a candidate.

There are certain disqualifications of which the main are:

- Bankruptcy.
- Having been sentenced to a term of imprisonment of not less than three months during the five years preceding the election.
- · Being disqualified under any enactment to corrupt or illegal practices.

As it is an Election year, if you wish to become a Parish Councillor you need to complete the Nomination Form and return it to the Election Office at Rushcliffe Borough Council by 4pm on the 4th April.

Please be aware that nomination forms need to be submitted to the District/Borough Elections office after they display their Election Notices on the 20th March and before 4pm on 4th April. Also, please note that an appointment needs to be booked at the Borough Elections office to drop off any nomination forms.
