

#### Kinoulton Allotments

During Covid lockdown and the later restrictions, the allotments were all fully let, a peaceful haven where we could exercise and wave to our socially distanced neighbours on nearby plots. As we return to something like normality there are now a few plots available. Several Hickling residents already have plots but recent arrivals in the village may be unaware of how the allotments run. Autumn is a good time to take over a plot. We have a society strimmer which we provide free to members, along with fuel and safety gear. This will help tame an overgrown plot. Strim in autumn and the grass will stop growing over the winter, giving an opportunity to mark out paths and beds. Autumn rain softens the soil for digging and, when that job is done, it is a good idea to cover the cleared beds to keep them weed-free till spring. Cardboard is a cheap and eco-friendly option. Recycle all those Amazon boxes. Spend the cold winter evenings browsing seed catalogues planning the delicious vegetables you will grow next year. We also have a community orchard whose fruit is shared between members. Last year branches broke under the sheer weight of fruit but supporting that quantity of fruit, along with the exceptionally hot summer, stressed the trees. This year they are mainly recovering and resting. They have appreciated the summer rain and have lots of fruit buds for next spring - their way of adapting to our variable seasons. My blackcurrants and raspberries also loved the rain and the late sunshine in September ripened the sweetcorn. I managed to pick it before the deer found it this year! Butterflies have also been abundant. Lush growth (including weeds, unfortunately) has provided food for their caterpillars and autumn sunshine has meant lots of late nectar-rich flowers in the wildflower areas.

The Allotment Society offers various plots from full size to mini ones. If you are intimidated by the thought of taking on a plot on your own, consider sharing with a friend/neighbour. Or join our community allotment (contact Carol Savage - casavage1@aol.com) where a group meet to share the work and the produce.

We hope the museum did not suffer too much due to events and activities having to be cancelled. Have you managed to now return to functioning as an attraction and historic centre for the people of Farmington?

This year has seen Hickling events and village activities returning to pre- pandemic times. The Scarecrow Festival in September was a huge success; the monthly Breakfast still draws in the crowds and the film club has even begun showing films once more.

The History Group has embarked on many projects to ensure the history of the village will be recorded for future generations. We hope you look regularly at our website – hicklingnottslocalhistory.com

Hopefully, with your permission we can have a link on this to your museum and Fred Maltby's Home in Michigan.

We managed to install the first information board in the village in 2023. This is placed outside of our village hall, the building which was once the village school. Information Boards are seen in many English villages and they display photographs and text about the life, buildings and history of the village. Hickling is hoping to have at least 6 boards placed near interesting parts of the village.

The 2nd information board for which we have just raised enough money, will be of particular interest to you. The board will be placed in the churchyard where the cherry tree planted by Fred's descendant still flourishes. The story of Fred's journey from Hickling to becoming Governor of Michigan will be told on our 2nd Board. As soon as it is installed, we will send you photographs.

Fund raising has now started for board no 3 which will be installed by the Canal. Hickling has the Grantham to Nottingham Canal passing through and although not used as a canal today is a haven for wildlife and flora. Photographers and painters find this part of the village a perfect place to produce images of the English countryside.

We hope you can find some Stilton Cheese in your supermarket to have at Christmas for as you know the milk for this cheese is produced here in Hickling. Our local milk goes to the Long Clawson Dairy which makes Stilton Cheese, some of which is exported by them to America. We find it fascinating that Fred Maltby became known as the King of Cheese and in England, Stilton Cheese is known as the King of cheese.

#### 'Carol-barking' by Laurie Lee

One by one they came stumbling over the snow, swinging their lanterns around their heads, shouting and coughing horribly. 'Coming carol-barking then?'



We were the Church Choir, so no answer was necessary. For a year we had praised the Lord out of key, and as a reward for this service - on top of the Outing - we now had the right to visit all the big houses, to sing our carols and collect our tribute.

To work them all in meant a five-mile foot journey over wild and generally snowed-up country. So the first thing we did was to plan our route; a formality, as the route never changed. All the same, we blew on our fingers and argued; and then we chose our Leader. This was not binding, for we all fancied ourselves as Leaders, and he who started the night in that position usually trailed home with a bloody nose.

Eight of us set out that night. There was Sixpence the Tanner, who had never sung in his life (he just worked his mouth in church); the brothers Horace and Boney, who were always fighting everybody and always getting the worst of it; Clergy Green, the preaching maniac; Walt the bully, and my two brothers. As we went down the lane other boys, from other villages, were already about the hills, bawling 'Kingwenslush', and shouting through keyholes 'Knock on the knocker! Ring at the Bell! Give us a penny for singing so well!' They weren't an approved charity as we were, the Choir; but competition was in the air.

Our first call as usual was the house of the Squire, and we trouped nervously down his drive. For light we had candles in marmalade-jars suspended on loops of string, and they threw pale gleams on the towering snowdrifts that stood on each side of the drive. A blizzard was blowing, but we were well wrapped up, with Army puttees on our legs, woollen hats on our heads, and several scarves around our ears.


As we approached the Big House across its white silent lawns, we too grew respectfully silent. The lake near by was stiff and black, the waterfall frozen and still. We arranged ourselves shuffling around the big front door, then knocked and announced the Choir.

A maid bore the tidings of our arrival away into the echoing distances of the house, and while we waited we cleared our throats noisily. Then she came back, and the door was left ajar for us, and we were bidden to begin. We brought no music, the carols were in our heads. 'Let's give 'em "Wild Shepherds",' said Jack. We began in confusion, plunging into a wreckage of keys, of different words and tempo; but we gathered our strength; he who sang loudest took the rest of us with him, and the carol took shape if not sweetness.

This huge stone house, with its ivied walls, was always a mystery to us. What were those gables, those rooms and attics, those narrow windows veiled by the cedar trees. As we sang 'Wild Shepherds' we craned our necks, gaping into that lamplit hall which we had never entered; staring at the muskets and untenanted chairs, the great tapestries furred by dust - until suddenly, on the stairs, we saw the old Squire himself standing and listening with his head on one

He didn't move until we'd finished; then slowly he tottered towards us, dropped two coins in our box with a trembling hand, scratched his name in the book we carried, gave us each a long look with his moist blind eyes, then turned away in silence.

As though released from a spell, we took a few sedate steps, then broke into a run for the gate. We didn't stop till we were out of the grounds.

#### The Royal British Legion Vale of Belvoir Branch Remembrance

Our Remembrance Service this year was held at St Luke's Church, Hickling, conducted by Reader Sheila Hill. We had a very full congregation including a large contingent from the Scouts and Cubs, commemorating the courage and sacrifice of the fallen in both World



Wars and recent conflicts. Sheila was assisted in her address by branch member Roger Barrett who spoke about the formation of the British Legion in 1921 and the services it provides for veterans today.

The Roll of Honour for our villages was read by Keith Oxby and, to mark the two-minute silence, Last Post and Reveille were played by bugler Jim Woolley. Afterwards, the members of the of the Legion, Scouts and Cubs with their Standard Bearers formed a procession to the War Memorial in Hickling. On rejoining members of the congregation there, Reveille was sounded, and wreaths were laid on behalf of the Legion, Hickling Parish Council and Scouts. Refreshments were provided by Pauline Chell, Alex Thomas and Liz Vear.

On Friday 10th November, Headteacher Simon Paramore, staff, and pupils gathered in front of the Kinoulton Village War Memorial for their traditional annual commemoration. The names of the fallen were read out, followed by a one-minute silence. The children sang a song about the fallen veterans. Then


#### The Poppy Appeal

## Headmaster's log book: 1876-1897

(one of our volunteers is currently transcribing the logbook which is full of the most fascinating snapshots of village life—in the meantime, a short extract)

1877 Novr 27: During the last two or three weeks many of the children have been rather late in the morning. I attribute this to the dark mornings & the fault f the parents in not rising earlier.

Decr 4: Mary Parr the pupil teacher in charge of the infants was obliged to leave school at 10.30 this morning, bring very ill.

Decr 10: Mary Parr has resumed her duties.

Decr 14: There are very few children present this morning owing to a horse race that is to come off at about 11 o'clock.

As nearly all the children have failed to come to school this afternoon owing to the horse & donkey races I am about to close school at about 3 o'clock therefore have not marked the register.

Decr 21: Closed the school until the 24th inst.


#### Decr 24: Commenced work after the Christmas holiday. Attendance very good.

1878 Jany 4: I have changed my usual monthly examinations to weekly  $\operatorname{\mathcal{C}}$  am about to have them every Friday.

Jany 8: At a Board Meeting last night I was authorised to see Mr Burnett about covering the pump and ventilating the class rooms.

Jany 23: I find it impossible to justly insist on clean boots as the roads are so fearfully dirty & many of the boys have outdoor work to do before coming to school.

Jany 28: Admitted Amy [March] a girl nearly 14 years old she barely knows the alphabet & knows nothing whatever about figures. She is only with us until May.



The two Christmas dates appear odd: at this time. Christmas Day on the 25th December wasa recognised public holiday and, in 1877, it fell on a Tuesday. The log book in future vears show a week's holiday for Christmas with classes

resuming after the 25th. If anyone can help to explain this, we'd love to hear from you.

# PLEASE HELP HICKLING W.I. RAISE £1000 FOR THE BLOOD BIKERS' CHARITY

Blood Bikers are a local charity who deliver urgent NHS supplies across the area. They have saved many lives and only continue to do so if they get donations to pay for fuel and other expenses. The charity has no paid employees, and everyone involved is a volunteer.

The HICKLING WI have set a target to raise £1000 for Blood Bikers which will go a long way in helping them continue for another year.

#### Letter from St Luke's

As the nights draw in the daylight, so abundant and taken for granted in the summer months, becomes increasingly precious and valued. It is not surprising therefore that lights, fireworks and candles feature greatly in the festivities occurring in this season as we try to create light and colour in the darkness.

In the Christian faith the symbolism of light has always been important. In Christian writings Christ is often referred to in terms of light, a light bringing warmth to our hearts and illumination to our minds, and this finds expression in our worship through such events as the lighting of the Easter Candle, the Christingles in Advent and the individual candles of those baptised into the Christian family. Candles are also often used as an aid to reflection and prayer, and in many churches, a place is provided in which candles can be lit and prayer offered.

Christmas festivities are surrounded by the symbolism of light, whether it is the candlelight of events in church, the electric sparkle of decorations in the shop windows and in our own homes, or even just the flicker of the television transmitting 'Christmas favourites'. This artificial light draws us closer to a recognition of Christ's true light, close to his love for us, and our hearts are warmed by it. Seasonal events aid our remembrance of his coming into the world on that first Christmas, coming not in glory but in the form of a vulnerable child. Loving us so much that he wanted to be with us, to experience what we experience in the trials, joys and even the monotony of daily life. This act of divine love is an event with such power and significance for humanity that the joy of its occurrence about 2000 years ago still has the ability to touch us today in what we often identify at this time of year as the 'Spirit of Christmas'.

Its effect is a wonderful sense of liberation. It frees us from the self-centred way of life that our day-to-day routine often demands of us, inspiring us to be our true selves, greeting others in love, looking with compassion toward the needy and unfortunate in our society, putting the interests of others above and beyond our own, and acknowledging God as our loving Father. In this way we come closer to God's plan and purpose for his children.

Once this is experienced it can never truly leave us. Whilst the festivities of the season may diminish to a dim remembrance in the rest of the year as once again light becomes commonplace and minds are fixed on events such as summer holidays, the Christmas experience of Christ's love never goes away.





#### Watercress and Stilton Soup

#### Ingredients

25g/ 1oz butter

1 onion chopped

2 garlic cloves chopped

850 ml /1 and a half pints chicken stock

450g potatoes peeled and diced

2 bunches of watercress

Freshly grated nutmeg

Salt and pepper

75g/3oz blue Stilton

200ml double cream

#### Method

- 1.Heat the butter in a large heavy based saucepan and add the onion and garlic and fry gently, stirring until softened( around five minutes). Taking care not to let them burn.
- Add the stock and potatoes and bring to the boil. Simmer for 20 minutes until the potatoes are tender.
- 3. Add the watercress and nutmeg and simmer for 2-3 minutes.
- 4. Blend the soup in a food processor, adding the Stilton in batches until smooth.
- 5.Add the cream and blend adjusting the thickness of the soup with a little more stock if needed.
- 6.Gently reheat the soup, check the seasoning and serve .Decorate with a sprig of watercress.

#### Stilton Cheese Loaf

This is a moist savoury loaf which is ideal for afternoon tea, a lunch bag or picnic.

It can be made in the microwave as well as the oven and is ideal for freezing.

#### Ingredients.

100g whole meal flour

100g self raising flour

1 tsp dried mustard

1/2 teaspoon baking powder

50g butter

1 medium egg

135ml milk (add an extra 50ml if cooking in the microwave)

100g Blue Stilton cheese

2 sticks of celery

50g chopped walnuts (can be replaced with sunflower seeds)

Poppy seeds for sprinkling on the top(optional.

#### Method

Heat the oven to 190c / gas 5 / or 375f.

- 1. Line the loaf tin.
- 2. Finely chop the celery
- Put the flours ,mustard and baking powder in to a bowl and rub in the butter with finger tips.
- 4. Crumble the Stilton cheese and rub in.
- 5. Add the finely chopped celery and walnuts or sunflower seeds
- 6. Beat the egg and milk together and add to the bowl.
- Mix well to give a fairly stiff consistency. If very stiff beat in a little more milk
- Spoon mixture in to prepared loaf tin or microwaveable dish ,sprinkle with poppy seeds if using.
- Bake for an hour until a skewer comes out clean or microwave on full power (650 watts) for 12 minutes.
- 10. Allow to cool before turning out.

Serve sliced spread with butter or cream cheese.

#### Oven Baked Leek and Stilton Risotto.

#### Ingredients.

10a butter

1 leek finely chopped

1/2 a red pepper deseeded and chopped

1 clove of garlic crushed.

150g risotto rice

600ml vegetable stock

65g baby leaf spinach

50g blue Stilton.

#### Method.

- 1. Wash and finely chop the leek.
- 2. Deseed and dice the red pepper
- 3. Put the butter in a pan and melt over a gentle heat.
- Add the leek , garlic and red pepper and cook for 10-12 minutes until soft.
- 5. Add the risotto rice to the pan and stir in to cover the rice with the juices.
- 6. Add the stock and stir gently
- Transfer the contents of the pan to an ovenproof dish with a tight fitting lid and place on the middle shelf of the oven preheated to 200c/180c fan/ gas 6. for 20 minutes.
- Remove from the oven when all the stock has been absorbed and add the spinach and Stilton
- 9. Stir through until the spinach is wilted and the Stilton is melted.
- 10. Serve immediately

#### Helping wildlife in winter (RSPCA)

We can all struggle with the changing weather. Our wildlife friends are no different. Here's how you can lend a helping hand to wildlife this winter.

winter, but you'll have to look closely to find them.



Feeding birds in winter: Birds may find it harder to find their normal food in winter, but you can help them to stay strong by leaving out extra food for them. Never try to use antifreeze or salt to thaw frozen ponds, birdbaths or any water container used by animals.

Helping badgers in severe weather: Badgers don't hibernate, but they do sleep through most of the severe weather. They have a tough time finding their favourite food of earthworms when the ground is frozen. They'd welcome nibbles such as lightly cooked meats, cheese, peanuts and fruit. Melting frozen ponds: Toxic gases can build up in frozen ponds, killing fish or frogs that may be hiding at the bottom. If you have a pond, check it every day for ice. If the pond does freeze over, carefully place a saucepan of hot water on the surface to melt a hole. Never tip boiling water onto it or break the ice with force, as this can harm fish.

Hibernating hedgehogs, frogs and mice: Before lighting bonfires, check wood or leaf piles carefully for wild animals such as hedgehogs, frogs and mice, who like to hibernate in these cosy spots. If you find wild animals in hibernation, be sure to leave them be.

#### WINTER WILDLIFE WATCHING: WHAT, WHERE AND WHEN TO SPOT (by Sally Bavin, Woodland Trust)

Winter can be tough for people and wildlife, but it's not all bleak - the season has a beauty all of its own. It's important for our mental health to stay connected with the natural world, even during the darkest, coldest months. While some species have flown south or tucked themselves away for the winter, you needn't do the same. Here's our guide to wildlife you can see at this time of year, plus where and when to find it: Winter Wildlife: What, Where and When to Spot - Woodland Trust Step out into that crisp winter air and take a wander through a woodland. Notice the details which are unveiled now that the trees stand bare. Look for intricate cow parsley stems sparkling with frost and laced with frozen spider webs. Peer between the tree trunks to spot a deer, nibbling frosty brambles, who lifts her head to stare back. Discover a range of fascinating bracket fungi clinging to naked trunks and branches. Take time to absorb and appreciate a magical winter wonderland with these special sights and more. In winter, small birds rove the woodland in large mixed-species foraging parties. Their quiet 'tit-tit' contact calls give away their presence. Look up to see blue tits, coal tits, great tits, long-tailed tits, or chaffinches and bramblings flitting between the bare branches. While most other birds have given up their song for the winter, robins redouble their efforts. This makes winter a perfect time to really get to know the robin's whistly tune. By spring, you'll be able to pick him out in the dawn chorus. Hazel catkins, like little cigars, are exposed by the leaf fall. Watch them from January as they transform into yellow lamb's-tails. The tiny female hazel flowers are a speck of hot pink against the grey palette of

Winter Gnats: you might witness a magical courtship dance, performed on the wing, by clouds of individuals who gather in woodland glades. Each male ascends slightly, then floats back down to the group before repeating his display. Their clear wings catch the low winter sunshine as they dance. It's easy to imagine you have stumbled upon a party of tiny fairies; in fact this is the lekking behaviour of the winter gnat as they gather together and put on a competitive display to try to attract a female. One of the few insects active in winter, these gnats don't bite so don't be afraid to take a doser look. I can't say the same about fairies.

Winter is a good time to keep an eye out for **mammal footprints** in the mud or snow. Look for signs of badgers, deer, otters, foxes, squirrels, mice and voles.

At dusk, starlings, in their spotty winter plumage, gather in mind-boggling murmurations before dropping into their night-time roosts. In the bare treetops, rookeries are revealed and jackdaws, rooks and crows make a noisy spectacle on their way home to roost every evening.

Partially frozen lakes, rivers and streams force kingfishers to stay and hunt in the same spots for longer, giving us the chance to catch more than a glimpse of electric blue. Redwing and fieldfare feast on hedgerow berries. Early winter twilight means you are more likely to encounter a barn owl hunting along country roads on your way home.

I attended a very engaged meeting with local farmers and landowners plus the new Neighbourhood policing inspector, Tim Cuthbert and police and Borough Council representatives plus the Police Commissioner. New high tech detective equipment was discussed including drones.

The recent arrest of criminals involved in farm machinery thefts in the area was discussed plus environmental crimes and fly tipping. These meetings are very productive and demonstrate the need for continual reporting of suspicious events, however minor, on 101 or 999 if serious, as all information adds to the jigsaw. There was also a presentation by the Woodland Trust on Agroforestry.

We are looking for all local farmers to engage with these meetings - your input is invaluable.

#### PARKING ON PAVEMENTS



#### Raised by parishioners:

**Dates of meetings:** parishioner stated that she could not find the agendas or minutes on the website, also that they had not seen a Facebook notification, however, they were on the notice board. The Clerk explained that they are circulated to the distribution list the week prior to the meeting and put on the website (clerk asked parishioner for email address so could ensure she is notified). Cllr Combellack said that she could not see them on the website. Cllr Green explained that we were transitioning from the old website to the new website which would be up and running soon.



Town & Country Planning Act 1990, Section 211, Notice of Proposed Works to trees in Hickling Conservation Area: Reduce and Thin 2 Cherry Trees, Fell Holly, Apple and Pear at 14 Harles Acres Ward Member report (given during the public session):

Cllr Combellack expressed a concern that the information that she supplied prior to the last meeting (as she had given her apologies), had not been mentioned at the meeting and that the Borough Councillor/County Councillor section on the minutes said no information from the Borough Councillor. Clerk apologised and explained that she was in hospital with a relative and that Cllr Prosser had kindly stepped in at very short notice – therefore, Cllr Prosser did not have any of the Clerk notes to convey at the meeting.

Cllr Combellack mentioned the previously discussed **Lengthsman Scheme** and felt it would be beneficial to the Hickling Parish, as the Lengthsman scheme would mean that there would be someone in the parish that could do all the maintenance jobs that arise, such as removal of grass growing in cracks in pavements, cleaning street signs etc.

Cllr Lamb explained that this had been discussed in length in a previous meeting, and the PC decided not to pursue this. Cllr Combellack said that it was funded by the County Council, (however, the information that had been circulated previously had mentioned matched funding), as this is the way the Government are funding minor works via grants. Action Point: Clerk to recirculate the Lengthsman Associated paper that was discussed at the meeting on the 5th September.

Cllr Combellack advised that Langer Parish Council have obtained £400,000 of grant monies to build a new village hall.

She wished to comment on **the priority traffic calming matter that was discussed at that last meeting** - the minutes state that this would urbanise the village - she did not agree with this assertion, as this been used successfully in other local villages. Cllr Lamb advised that is had been discussed at the last meeting and agreed not to pursue.

Cllr Combellack left the meeting at 7.25pm.

Cllr Playle was concerned about the **speeding traffic** around the basin and the speed that he has seen school buses going along the road by the basin. He suggested that the PC write to the bus companies and schools to raise this concern.

It was agreed that letters should be sent to the following school/bus companies that offer transport to Kinoulton Primary School, the Beckett School, Loughborough Grammar School, Grantham Grammar School, and Toot Hill School.

Action Point: Cllr Playle to draft letter to schools / bus companies and circulate to the PC.

#### Finance & Assets:

Assets of Community Value; no update

Conservation Area Appraisal - Review; no update

**Co-opting of Parish Councillor(s):** Mike Conway co-opted as a new Parish Councillor at the meeting held on November  $14^{th}$ . One vacancy remains.

#### Noticeboard Relocation:

Estimated date for noticeboard to be positioned in Hickling Pastures is 6th October TBC - it will be positioned by the A606 bus stop (northbound) in Hickling Pastures. RBC permit had been received enabling the works to proceed and a final cost of £200 had been quoted for the relocation works.

#### Parish Cemetery:

Terms and Conditions for items put on graves such as planters/vases: Clerk had recently attended a cemetery training session and circulated the suggested terms and conditions of Memorial Permit Conditions to be supplied when a plot is reserved, this was proposed by Cllr Playle and seconded by Cllr Lane, agreed by all.

Walkers' Green: Cllr Lamb to carry out monthly inspection.

**Environment:** 

**RBC Community Tree Scheme;** no interest from landowners, so no application has been submitted this year.

**Roadside Verges:** Cllr Playle has contacted Laura Trussler at RBC as the roadside verges should have been cut in September, but there is a problem accessing the machinery.

Highways & Street Furniture:

Works to be carried out - information from Cllr John Cottee: Draining issue works outside the Orchard are booked to take place 08:00am 26/9/23 - 17:00 28/9/23 by Severn Trent Water.

Community Engagement:

**Website:** Clir Green advised that the old website had been paid for by a parishioner, this will be suspended from middle of 2024. A re-direction can be put on the old website to connect to the new website once the invoice has been paid. Access rights can be given to local groups, it was mentioned previously that the History Group did not want access, however, it could possibly be linked to their website.



The Wise Child of Wysall is one of the unusual names given to a young boy who lived in this pretty Nottinghamshire village in 1623.

People from as far afield as Wollaton and Trowell (which would have been around a 5 hour walk away) were said to have trekked the distance to be healed by him. This goes to prove how well known the Wise Child would have been in the area at this time, as people had obviously heard of his healing powers and would have been desperate for a cure. Unsurprisingly this would not have been popular with the authorities for various reasons, including the suspicion of witchcraft which was common during this period. The church did not approve as they believed it was contrary to God's word, and up to twenty people were brought before the ecclesiastical courts for visiting the Wise Child for healing. This included a man from West



Bridgford who apparently carried his child there. The villagers all pleaded guilty but were thankfully dismissed and never charged. The Wise Child himself remains an enigma, as he was never formally charged of witchcraft and appears to have disappeared into obscurity. This seems almost unbelievable when you think of how his fame spread so quickly, for him simply to disappear and never be heard of again. But perhaps this seemingly quiet end to the tale ended up being for the best, and the Wise Child of Wysall lived out the rest of his days in peace.


As we unfortunately no longer know where the Wise Child actually lived in Wysall, I have included a photo of their lovely church instead!
